
ADDISON, Ala. - Football season is back in Addison and Head Coach David Smothers is entering his 13th season with the Bulldogs. Smothers currently holds a 98-41 record and has led Addison to the playoffs in II of the 12 previous seasons but he says he could care less about any personal milestones he could reach this year. His focus is on making sure this year's team is as good as it can be.

"It doesn't mean anything to me. Individual records are just that individual. I am more concerned about our team goals and what our team can achieve together," Smothers said. "We need to win the region. I

want to win the region. We have to go through Hackleburg, and they have basically everybody back. Our schedule is a little tougher, we picked up Decatur Heritage this year, but we get Hackleburg and Decatur Heritage at

Addison will be without their two time home." all-state selection senior quarterback Jed Wilkins this season and Smothers knows it'll be a challenge to replace him on both sides of the ball.

"Losing Jed hurts and I hate it for him because he is a senior and this is his last year to play football. Jed was our leader on »

he was on offense, to me I will miss him more on defense because he made our calls and got our guys in the right positions. You couldn't ask for a better players vying for the quarterback position in fall camp and they all have experience. Senior Kaden Dyson, sophomore Elijah Roberts and freshman Scout Flynn are in the mix. Smothers believes that whoever doesn't win the quarterback competition will contribute at another position.

"All three players have different

"All three players have different strengths and weaknesses. The most important thing about them is that they are all competitors and are good character kids," Smothers said. "The strength of our team is probably our offensive line. We have four out of five starters returning and we have two excellent senior leaders in Bobby Williams and Bradley Willette.


"Those two young men haven't missed a summer workout or meeting and are leading by example. I firmly believe that they will hold their teammates accountable in the effort department as well as keeping them


motivated."

Addison will have some first-year players that were not necessarily starters but played a lot of snaps on offense last season. At running back, senior Jordan Hubbert, junior Trennon Burns and junior Seth Hammack are the returning backs who got significant playing time last year. The wide receiver group will include sophomore Judah Wilkins and Junior Shelton Alexander.

"We have a ton of athletic younger guys, and I can't wait to see how they develop. Those kids will be vastly improved from week one to week five.

"It's going to be fun to watch them grow up on the field," Smothers listed some of the names in the mix for those spots. "In no particular order, Skyler Cleghorn, Zayne Smith, Brye Dollar, Brodie Willingham, Wyatt Anderson, Major Snoddy and Judah Wilkins. The younger guys are "





just a bunch of scrappers and I love that."

Coach Smothers is excited about what the Bulldogs have coming back on defense this season and believes they'll be able to cause some problems for their opponents.

"We are going to be physical and hardnosed as most Addison teams are," Smothers said.

"I know we will have some growing pains early on due to our youth, but I know we will continue to grow and get better as the season goes on."

Some players to watch on defense will be linebackers Brodie Willingham and Jordan Hubbert, defensive back Elijah Roberts, Cole Roberts and Kaden Dyson and defensive linemen Bradley Willette, Kasen Hill, Lane Stewart and Tanner Lawrence.

Smothers is happy with the makeup of his team on paper but knows they will have to improve week to week to accomplish their goals.

"Depth is obviously a concern for most teams but especially at this level (IA). You lose a guy and that usually opens up two or three positions since one player goes both ways (offense & defense)."

Senior Bobby Williams (Three-year starter)

"I feel that if we as players do what we are supposed to do and listen to the coaches, then we are in store for an amazing season. We have a bunch of guys that want to be out here and have been willing to sacrifice their personal time to become better both on and off the field. I firmly believe that our offensive line will be the cornerstone of our team and our team will be only as good as our line is."

Senior Bradley Willette (Four-year starter)

"We have some young kids out here that want to learn and be better players and that is where me and Bobby (Williams) come in as the old guys on the line. We have to teach them what it takes to be a Bulldog. We plan on having an exceptional year this year and I know that the Coaches will be able to lean on the offensive line to carry us where we

need to go."

Senior Jordan Hubbert (Two-year starter)

"We are going to have to depend on a lot of young players to step up and help us this year. I feel we have a good team, and we have the ability to be a very good team. I know we have all talked and we want to be a very physical team. We want to be the team that no one wants to play because you are just beat up after playing us."

Senior Kaden Dyson (Two-year

starter)

"We are going to do everything we can to bring a title back to Addison. It's been about 20 years since we last won it and it is time to bring the trophy back to where it belongs.

"In order to do that, our veteran players are going to have to set the example for the young guys and show them through hard work and dedication what needs to be done to accomplish that feat."

The players and coaches all believe that this team, though young, has the potential to accomplish some pretty

big things this year. The schedule is a little tougher than last year, but Addison will have a good chance to finish at least second, behind Hackleburg, in the region. If they can do that, a playoff berth is guaranteed but a long playoff run will depend on how the players improve from week one to the end of the season. It should be a fun year and the players are bristling with confidence. So, when Addison travels to Winston County to kick off the season, looking to snap a three-game losing streak against its archrivals, it should be fun. Roll Addi Roll!

CULLMAN, Ala. — It's August, and that means it's just about time to kick things off and get football season underway. All of our local teams have begun their fall camps and at Cullman High School, the Bearcats have been hard at work preparing for their season opener on Aug. 22.

Danny Stiff is entering his second season as the head coach at Cullman and after finishing the regular season 5-5 and earning a postseason berth last year, he's looking forward to seeing what his team can do in year two. Stiff says the familiarity with the returning players has made things easier in the preseason this time around.

"Last year I had been with the kids a lot before we played but you never really know people until you get into a game environment. I've seen a lot of these guys play a lot of football, but it was hard for me not having spring training in pads and kind of waiting to do that now," Stiff said.

"I think the comfort of the players with what we do schematically and the understanding of not only the plays but the reason we run the plays and the concepts behind them I think is a little more advanced than it was last year when everything was new to

"So, we've got some guys coming back that understand it a lot better and when your players know it well, they can pull other players aside and they'll ask questions that they won't ask me. When their peers know the right answers that helps everybody along."

Identifying leadership within the team is very important to Stiff and he's been pleased to see several new and returning players step into those roles as the season approaches.

"We have leaders back that were leaders last year as juniors too, like Ben Conway. He was the only guy that was a junior that was a team captain last year and the rest of them were seniors so he already kind of had that

role and then it's about the other guys that

"Sometimes it happens naturally and will step up. sometimes you're forced into leadership roles because of your role as a player on the team. I think of someone like Cooper Ogstad who's a quiet person that doesn't have a lot of confrontation to him but he's going to have to learn lead in his own way because whether he likes it or not, he is a leader of the team," Stiff said.

"So, you just have to remind guys like that that people are watching your actions and watching what you do. It just is that way. Some people step up and are more vocal and then some guys say things in the locker room or other settings, and everyone is different. I think when you have the right environment and atmosphere for guys to be comfortable doing that, you'll have someone rise up every "That part happens kind of naturally " vear.

CULLMAN HEAD COACH DANNY STIFF and then you have to fill the holes as the head coach and step in when you need to, but you want them to lead the team."

The Bearcats will have to replace a lot of offensive production from last year's team but Stiff feels a lot better about that when he sees how much the offensive line has improved and who is returning at skill positions.

"The first group that pops into my head is the offensive line because I can remember the day we started our two hour practices in our first spring last year and seeing them and thinking, 'holy moly, we've got a long way to go.' That's a critical position and those guys got so much better between that first day out there and the fall. So now we fast forward a year and we still have four of those guys. We kind of look at them as the rock of the team and I thought about it during spring this year how much better we feel about the offensive line

and how big of a positive it is now. At receiver we lose Wyatt Buchanan, and he was a huge part of the offense and an awesome football player.

"Cooper Ogstad is going to have to step up and he has a lot of experience, and he can do it. He was just kind of behind Wyatt last year in terms of who Tanner (Gaines) was going to look at.

"Cooper made some huge plays in his own right in some clutch situations, so we know he's got that in him and he's just going to have handle being the guy and I think he's ready for that."

Stiff is excited about some of the new additions to the Bearcat backfield as well.

"We're determined to have people that can run the football this year, several of them. One guy that has really stood out is Cooper Loftin

"He's a big guy, plays baseball and came back out to play football

this year for the first time since ninth grade and he's a big guy that can move," Stiff said. "He's one of the fastest guys on the team and we haven't seen him in pads yet but with his size and the way he moves I doubt that's going to be anything I'll be disappointed with. He's a really good kid that's eager to learn and eager to be coached."

The 'Cats will be hungry to topple their rivals like Harstelle and Jasper and get back to the playoffs once again but something else Stiff will be looking for this season is the way his team plays. He wants to see consistency and efficiency as the season goes on.

"I want to see the maturity and growth of execution in games. I think if we take all of our kids' best plays in practice or their best plays in games and we find a way to make those more consistently, I think we'll be a much better football team," Stiff said. "I think that just comes from practice habits and you've got to be at the speed and the attention and focus of a game in practice so that when we get out there for a game, it's not the first time you've had to do that.

"That's where you press every day as a coach to try to get them playing at that speed. I pick on those things everyday so that it makes them practice in more of a gamelike environment and they get more comfortable.

"That sounds easy, but it's very hard. It's very hard to mentally do that, it's hard to physically push yourself to do that. We're just trying to reach that point and want to make people beat us. I want to make somebody beat us without us beating ourselves. Don't give it to them. That's been our biggest emphasis that I've been thinking about probably every day since last November."







Aggies excited to get back on the field in 2024

FAIRVIEW, Ala. — Football season is nearly upon us once again and in Fairview, that means it's nearly time for the Aggies to hit the field and take another run at the state playoffs. Fairview has punched its ticket to the postseason for five consecutive seasons, but head coach George Redding knows they'll have a host of new challenges to overcome if they want to make it back in 2024. The Aggies have some big contributors returning at key positions as well as some new faces stepping into new roles and Redding has been watching to see how they all fit together throughout the summer and the preseason.

"We've got about five or six guys coming back on both sides of the ball. We have some really good players coming back that we're excited about. We also lost some really good players from last year. You hate losing players to graduation and each year you kind

of have to go back to the drawing board and try to find some new faces that can step into those roles and learn the things that they can do," Redding said. "So, we're really excited about those new faces, and I think the real key for ones who are coming back is to build leadership and chemistry on this team. We have a small senior class, we only have seven seniors this year and we do have 14 juniors, 14 sophomores and II freshmen right now. So, the biggest thing for us right now is really focusing on leadership and team chemistry and trying to mesh all the new faces together."

The Aggies will have to prepare for some changes and new faces with some of their regional opponents this season as well.

"We are familiar with a lot of our opponents having been in that same region. We've played Priceville over the years as

well. The thing is, four of the seven schools in our region have new head coaches so with that being the case, we know we're going to have our work cut out for us because there will be some changes. Even though we feel like we have a good idea on some personnel, we know that for a lot of those teams some of the scheme is going to change and as a staff we'll have to work hard to try and figure that out to give our kids the things that they need to be successful."

Developing leadership has been a priority for Redding and his staff this offseason. He's been proud to see several players embrace those roles and set an example for the younger members of the team.

"I definitely thing we're getting there. That's been the focus of a lot of our conversations. We had a conversation with some of the older guys after one of our summer workouts about how important that is. I think these guys understand that they won't be successful without the guys below them. Just like with some of our other teams in past years, it took these guys helping those older guys. So, the younger guys have got to be able to do their part for us to be

successful, but it takes leadership in order to get there," Redding said. "You don't have to be a senior to be a leader, that's for sure, but the good teams have good senior leadership. We've talked about what's expected of these guvs and they understand what it takes to win. They've been part of some really good teams and they've been leaders in the past. I think the transition happens when you've been maybe a second leader or a guy that was saying things from behind because there were others already out in front, and we've had a lot of those on the last couple teams that we've had but now these guvs have to be that up front voice and I think that's what we're transitioning to."

One of this year's seniors, Blake Rickard, has seen the team's leadership grow together throughout the offseason and wants to see it continue to build as the season approaches.

"I think at the beginning we probably started out a little slow on leadership but as we played the 7-on-7s and have had more practices I think we're growing together a lot better. We started out slowly but we're getting there," Rickard said.
"It's more about the little things, not just the big things. It's helping someone else when they don't know what to do or just asking someone if they need help and it's things like that that we're piecing together."

Redding is excited to have a lot of players returning on the offensive side of the ball this season, but he and his staff are still working to fill some holes on the defensive end.

"I know right out of the gate the noticeable thing is we have both of our running backs back. Our guarterback is back and two of our linemen are back too. We lost a really good lineman from last year but we played multiple linemen last year so we have some guys that might be somewhat new faces this year that are battle tested. The receiver position is where we lost some seniors so we're moving some guys into those roles, and we're excited about seeing what they can do," Redding said. "They've really come on this spring and summer. We got into some competitions this summer and they showed some really good things so we're excited about what those guvs can do. Defensively, we

lost some guys at stack linebacker. Cale (Foster) and Eric (Gonzalez) were a tremendous presence when they were out there, and we lost some guys at the safety position too, so we've got some holes that we've got to fill but we've got some guys that we're excited about coming in. Depth is another concern for us so anytime you have new faces and low depth behind that, it can be a problem so it's very important for us to get everybody up to speed."

The Aggies have goals to stack the win column and return to the state playoffs this season, but Redding is proud that no matter what happens under the lights this fall, his team is full of young men that will be successful after football is over.

"I think the biggest thing for is just everybody learning what it takes to be successful on a Friday night," Redding said. "We can't wait until Friday night to figure those things out or we'll be in trouble but I'm excited about this group. I love this group and I think they can do good things. I think they'll do more things than just football, that's the biggest thing for me."



GOOD HOPE, Ala. — Football season is right around the corner, and all of our local teams are gearing up for another season on the gridiron. In Good Hope, Alan Scott will be entering his 10th season as the head coach of the Raiders, and he'll have experience returning on both sides of the ball this year. Scott saw a lot of encouraging things from his team during their spring game and during summer workouts. He's looking forward to seeing their hard work pay off when they kick things off later this month.

"A majority of our offensive and defensive returners were starters last year," Scott said. "The number one thing that we want to do is compete. In the spring game, we played Fyffe and Vinemont in both halves. I thought our guys played really well. It was a good chance for us to play some really good competition. They didn't back down, and from a defensive standpoint, I was really pleased with our effort, intensity, and our tackling. Throughout the summer, we've just tried to get bigger, faster, and stronger, do all of the little things right, and try to help ourselves be ready to compete this fall."

Scott added, "Fyffe has been kind of the standard in high school football for the last 10 years. Coach Benefield and I have been friends for a long time, and we finally got the game together. We got our wires crossed a little bit, so that's why we played them in the spring," Scott said. "We are actually going to play them week 0 for four quarters here coming up. We played them for a half. We played the varsity for a quarter, and it was 7-0. Then, we played the JV for a quarter, and it was 7-0, so I thought our guys hung in there with them."

Good Hope will be in a new region this year, and the schedule will present some new challenges for the Raiders.

"We've been over there with Oneonta, Cherokee County, and Etowah the last several years, and they did move us west. Dora, Cordova, Curry, Fayette County, Hamilton, Haleyville, and Fultondale stayed in there with us, so it's interesting. Some teams moved up from 3A, and a lot of those teams that are in our region have competed against each other for the past couple of years, so we're kind of the new kid on the block," Scott said. "I »

see a lot of parity in our region. In the offseason, I've really tried to watch a lot of film, any that I can get my hands on from the opponents that we're going to have this fall.

"They're well-coached. The programs all have great histories, so I think it'll be a real dog fight to try to come out of there and get a playoff spot."

One of Good Hope's assistant coaches on staff, Taft Dillashaw, was inducted into the Cullman County Sports Hall of Fame this summer and Scott shared how much Dillashaw has meant to his own football career as both a player and a coach.

"I played Junior High football, around either 1991 or 1992, and Taft was there. He had been there, you know? That wasn't his first year. All I've ever known about Good Hope football, he's been involved in it," Scott said.

"He coached me there. He coached me through high school. He was really hard on me, but I love him. I really do. He was really hard on me, but he was trying to get everything he could out of me.

"When I became a coach, as a young coach, he was a guy I would call. As a defensive coordinator, if it was something I hadn't seen before, he and I would try to figure it out together.

"When I was at Vinemont, there was no team that I wanted to beat more than Taft and Good Hope, but now that I'm at Good Hope, I'm thankful to have been able to work with him for the last IO years in my role now. He's just a blessing."

Coach Scott has seen the seniors and juniors take on leadership roles during the preseason, and likes the way they younger guys have followed their example.

"It's going good so far. We're trying to stress leadership at Good Hope and have been since I've been there. Each team elects seven young men that they want to represent the team, and Hank Hudson and Tyler Cone will be two of them that will represent the team," Scott said.

"They've done a great job of trying to make sure that these young guys kind of know the ropes, and they are holding the expectations and the standards up, so that they don't slip. The young guys are following well, too."

Two of the seniors on this year's team, Hank Hudson and Tyler Cone, feel like the team has really bought in to the goals that they are building towards this season and are looking forward to seeing what they can accomplish together.





HANCEVILLE HEAD COACH Levi estes HANCEVILLE, Ala. — Fall has arrived, meaning students are returning to school, the leaves will begin falling soon and football season is right around the corner. In Hanceville, Levi Estes is preparing to kick off his first season as head coach of the Bulldogs and he's proud of the way his team worked throughout the offseason to prepare for the upcoming year.

"Right now, I can say we have a bunch of young men who are extremely hard working. They're giving us everything they've got every day and we've put them through some pretty tough activities.

"One thing I preach to them over and over again is to be a tough, strong person you have to go through and do tough things, so we've tried to embed that in everything that we do," Estes said.

"We try to create competition in practice so that we have that competitive edge when

we get into a game on Friday night. We want to carry everything that we do in our summer offseason program into the new football

Season."

Estes spent some time coaching in Estes spent some time coaching in Tennessee before arriving at Hanceville and he says it has been a bit of an adjustment for him as he becomes familiar with the differences in Alabama's

"One thing that's been a big transition moving from state to state has been all the rules that you have to learn about what you can do

can do.

"When I was in Tennessee, we had two
scrimmages and a jamboree before we even
played our first game," Estes said.

"Alabama allows you that one jamboree and I kind of like that better than playing in the spring because it gives you a little better idea of what you have coming into the

season."

The line of scrimmage should be an area where Hanceville has some experience on the field this fall, and Estes is looking forward to seeing that group gel together. He knows a strong group up front will help the Bulldog skill players shine too.

"I like to talk about linemen first because I was a lineman in college. Up front we've got three guys that are returning that played a lot last year offensively and I'm very excited about that. Finding the two players to fill those last two spots has been huge.

"We've got about five guys up for those two spots and it's been good to watch that competition grow at practice and in the weight room. Hunter Black is our returning quarterback and I'm excited to see the growth he's made in the offseason and to see how he adapts to the things that have changed for us offensively," Estes said.

"A spot where I think we'll have a lot of competition is at running back. We've got Marquies Lieth returning and he played a lot of running back last year and we also have a rising sophomore, Zavier Malcom, who is pushing him every day.

"Both of those guys are extremely good athletes, so it's been a good competition watching those guys get after each other in the backfield and push each other every day."

The Bulldogs are making some adjustments on the defensive side of the ball this season and Estes is excited to see how his guys fit into their new roles.

"Defensively, I'm excited about the changes that we've made. We're changing to an odd front from an even front that they used last year and just seeing those guys accept those roles has been great.

"Eli Akin was the County Lineman of the Year last year and we've kind of challenged him by moving him to linebacker this year. We challenged him to see if he could take a new step in a different role and still compete at a high level and I think he's done a great job there doing some things that are a little bit out of his comfort zone," Estes

said.

"That's something we preach on a lot; you don't want to be comfortable. If you're comfortable, you're not growing, and I firmly believe that. You've got to step out of your comfort zone, step out of the box so that you can grow and the people around you can grow.

"So, I'm extremely excited to see what comes when we finally put the shoulder pads on."

The Bulldogs won't have as many players on the roster as some of their opponents this fall but Estes likes the makeup of his team and knows they'll play hard for one another once they're under the lights.

"We have nine seniors this year and I think every one of them has a chance to be a contributor in some way.

"One thing that I look at in a captain is that it doesn't necessarily have to be a senior.

"I look for someone who is there every day, does the right things, doesn't skip any reps and leads sometimes vocally, but a lot of the time silently. Leading by their actions and doing the right things," Estes said.

"We're pretty small in numbers, we have about 30 kids on the roster right now, but I think that we've got 30 kids that are ready to go to battle together.

"They're gelling together, hanging out outside of the program together and doing a really good job of building each other up."

"It's extremely valuable. The week before the Fourth of July, we started our five day a week training and we went to Danville for an OTA practice and what we were able to do and how advanced we were on just our fourth day was good.

"We put a lot on them, physically and mentally, and they can handle it because of all the different offenses they've played in. From 9 a.m. to about 4 p.m. that day at Point Mallard we played seven games, and it was hot. During that seventh game you're just kind of wondering 'How did we get to this point.'. We don't have a huge roster, but these guys have taken on ownership of learning and have been amazing at coming to work."

Coaching changes have been nothing new at Holly Pond over the last few years and that much turnover can make it more difficult for players to become comfortable in their roles.


But, after watching them work this summer, McDaniel is excited to see how much his team can continue to grow once they kick things off.





MEEK HEAD COACH Daniel Evans ARLEY, Ala. — Football season is fast approaching and at Meek High School, head Coach Daniel Evans and the Tigers are preparing to kick things off at the end are preparing to kick things off at the end of August. Evans will be heading into his second season as the head coach of the Tigers and after helping lead Meek to a 6-5 Tigers and a playoff berth last year, he feels record and a playoff berth last year, he feels even more comfortable in his role as year two gets underway.

"Having a better idea of how my role changes from being an assistant coach to being a head coach has slowed things down for me so that definitely helps with the day-to-day stuff. You still have a lot of stuff to prepare and prep and organize and have to make sure everything is the way it's supposed to be so that takes a lot of work," Evans said. "It takes a lot of effort and these kids put a lot of effort in so it's our job as coaches to

make sure we're doing the same thing. It has slowed down a little bit but at the end of the day, August is August, and there's always a

lot to do."

Evans was very pleased with his team's focus and effort during the offseason and is excited to see the habits they created in workouts carry over to the football field.

"I would say our culture is the best
that it's been in a few years, and that's no
disrespect to the guys that came before, but
these guys have been around me and they kind

of get that workman's attitude. I don't like to
just rest on being good athletes or gifted, we
just rest on being good athletes or gifted, we
work. I think it's important for them to work
and they picked up on that pretty early,"

Evans said. "I've also got a couple of guys
that have played four years for myself and
that have played four years for myself and
so it's been pretty easy for these kids to

understand what we're trying to do, and they've worked their butts off since January to do what they need to do. Now we're getting to a point where they can reap the rewards. I've had to turn the lights on from my phone a couple times because I've had kids up there working at 7:30-8:00 at night and they call me and ask if I can turn the lights on for an hour so they can get some work in. So, these kids are ready to go."

One of the position groups that Evans is most excited about is the defensive line. He believes the Tigers will have as good a defensive front as they'll see all season and he's looking forward to watching them terrorize opposing offenses this fall.

"Our defensive line is going to be as good if not better than pretty much everybody in IA North and I know what that sounds like but I'm not going to apologize for it. We're really strong up there and we're also very seasoned. They're pretty athletic and that group uses their hands well so they're going to be an issue for a lot of people. We kind of saw that during II-on-II during the summer. So that group is going to be really good and another thing for us is we probably have more team speed than I think I've had at this school in the four years I've been here," Evans said.

"We're going to have a lot of guys competing for skill jobs like wide receivers, DBs and positions like that. On the offensive line we've got some young guys that have worked their butts off that are pushing some of these older guys for positions, which is good. I don't want kids to think they can be complacent. I always tell them that they have to compete, and everything is up for grabs all the time, so you've got to make sure that you're doing what you're supposed to be doing. Those kids going into IOth grade took the weight room

very seriously and they're going to start pushing some of these older guys for starting jobs pretty quick."

The Tigers have big goals this season and are hungry to return to the postseason. Evans has big expectations for his team on the field this season but something else that means a lot to him is that his team enjoys playing the game. The Tigers also have all three of their Winston County Rivals on the schedule this year and Evans knows those games will mean a lot to his players and the community.

"I just want us to compete every week and enjoy the game. I think it's real easy to get caught up in wins and losses and forget how fun this game is. For IO or I2 of my guys this is it. Obviously, there are opportunities to play in college, but that stuff is not guaranteed. They've got IO regular season games and that's all that's guaranteed so I just want them to have fun and enjoy being around

each other and enjoy the greatness that is high school football," Evans said.

"You don't experience anything else like it for the rest of your life. I'm not saying it's better than anything else, but it is its own unique thing and once you get done playing this game, you just don't really find anything sports-wise that compares to all the preparation just to play one game on a Friday night with so much energy and intensity.

"On top of all that we've got every county school on the schedule for the first time in a while, so it'll be nice to travel around to a couple places and have some teams from around here come to us. We go to Lynn and then Winston County and Addison will come to us so we get to play the county schools and those games are extremely important to me and to Winston County in general so that's something I'm looking forward to."





"I feel like getting off the field on third downs is big defensively and mainly on the offensive side we want to score at least three or four times a game.


"The main thing will just be to compete and have everyone doing their job because if everyone does their job we'll be in pretty good shape in each game."


